By the Numbers

In Unit 6 you learned a bunch of slang words that represent quantities:

Some other slang words stand for quantities and are based on numbers. You probably already know the expressions a couple of (= about two), half a drag (= about two), half a drag (= twelve or about twelve):





There's a pileup of about a dozen cars on the interstate.

Note that of often gets the "uh" pronunciation in the expression couple of when the next word starts with a consonant sound:

a couple of minutes /'kʌplə/ a couple of hours /'kʌpləy/

Several other slang words take the place of different numbers. The number zero has the most slang synonyms:









Zip, **zilch**, **nada**, and **squat** are all slang for zero or **nothing**. **Zip**, **zilch**, and **squat** can also take the place of **anything** when **anything** is used with a negative word:

"He can't see squat without his glasses." = He can't see anything without his glasses.

"She won't give you zilch for that." = She won't give you anything for that.

"That doesn't mean zip to me." = That doesn't mean anything to me.

Unlike *nothing*, **zip**, **zilch**, and **squat** don't count as negatives, so you don't create a double negative when you use these words with *not*.
